## **EVIDENCE**

#### DESCRIPTION

To the north-west of Burnmouth Farmstead and set alongside the road right on the edge of the steep drop to the burn are the ruins of a rectangular structure c7m wide and at least 9m long. Most of the walling, of roughly coursed stone and c.0.65m thick is of 18th century character, but the western part of the north wall is of much more massive stonework, c.0.9m thick and clearly older; it could be the remnant of a bastle, or bastle period building. Further east there are traces of footings or perhaps paving, in the level area between the main farm building and the steep drop to the burn. Just beyond a walled garden attached to the north-east end of the main farm building range, are the remains of another rectangular building shown as an outline (therefore ruinous) on the 1st edition Ordnance Survey of 1866. This has walling up to 1m thick, the building may have been c.9m by 6m externally, although the south west end wall may in fact have been an internal division as the footings of the south wall seem to continue beyond it an disappear under the garden wall. It may have been a bastle or perhaps a long house.
