DESCRIPTION

There is a row of ruined cottages above Stokoe Crags, and once called Crag Cottages for that reason. The main building measures about 33 feet by 20 feet and still has some thick walling, as high as 8 feet in places. This was undoubtedly a bastle, but the building adjoining to the its east is puzzling. It measures 40 feet long, but is only 15 feet wide. It is therefore more like a long house, but its construction is very bastle-like, and there is a partly-blocked gun loop in its gable wall. [Pastscape]

Ryder in Frodsham (2004) writes: Stokoe Crags introduces us to another interesting subject the development of farmsteads in the post bastle period, to produce an elongate range of buildings, the classic linear farm so characteristic of most of the country before the Agrarian revolution of c1800. At Stokoe Crags the first addition, built on to the entrance end of the original bastle/house was a rather longer building provided with a cross-passage set against the end wall of the earlier structure.... Later still the range was extended by another block, almost certainly a barn or byre; beyond this comes the final ruinous section of the line of building, but here the walls are thicker again, hinting that there may have been a second bastle here. The farm seems to have been abandoned around the beginning of the Nineteenth century and, lying remote from any road, has seen little interference since.
