EVIDENCE

Extant, Shown and named on the 1st Edition of OS '6 inch' Map Northumberland Old Series Sheet 59 Surveyed 1862.

DESCRIPTION

Two-storey two-bay house of rather tall proportions. Probably early C18th, altered 1808 and later C19th. Roughly squared stone with roughly-shaped quoins. Left of centre doorway has initials WM and date 1808 in oval panel on lintel, this presumably dates heightening of opening (see change in stone type.) 4-pane late C19ht sashes. Coped gables; stepped endstacks with chamfered caps. Welsh slate roof. Attached outbuilding to right heightened and rear outshot added in late C19ht. Single storey outbuilding to left and (L-plan) far right are probably early C19th. [after Grundy 1987].
